**Bible**: We believe the Bible to be the complete Word of God; that the sixty six books, as originally written, comprising the Old and New Testaments were verbally inspired by the Spirit of God and were entirely free from error; that the Bible is the final authority in all matters of faith and practice and the true basis of Christian union.

**God**: We believe in One God, Creator of all, Holy Sovereign, Eternal, Existing in three equal persons; the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

**Christ**: We believe in the absolute and essential deity of Jesus Christ, in His eternal existence with the Father in pre-incarnate glory, in His essential humanity, in His virgin birth, sinless life, substitutionary death, bodily resurrection, triumphant ascension, mediatory ministry and personal return.

**Holy Spirit**: We believe in the absolute and essential deity and personality of the Holy Spirit, Who convinces of sin, of righteousness, and of judgment; Who regenerates, sanctifies, illuminates, comforts and gives gifts to those who believe in Jesus Christ.

**Satan**: We believe that Satan is a spirit being who is an evil personality, the originator of sin, the archenemy of God and man, whose eternal destiny in hell is certain.

**Man**: We believe that man was divinely created in the image of God; that he sinned, resulting in the fact that every aspect of his total being is depraved. Man thereby incurred the condemnation of God, resulting in physical, spiritual and eternal death.

**Salvation**: We believe that salvation is by the sovereign, electing grace of God; that Christ voluntarily suffered a substitutionary death for sinners that completely satisfied God's righteous demands; that justification is by faith alone in the all-sufficient sacrifice and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ and that those whom God has saved shall be divinely preserved and finally perfected in the image of the Lord.

**Future Things**: We believe in the personal, bodily and glorious return of the Lord Jesus Christ; in the resurrection of the just and unjust; in the eternal blessedness in heaven of the redeemed and in the judgment and conscious, eternal punishment in hell of the wicked.

**The Local Church**: We believe that the church is a company of immersed believers, voluntarily associated for worship, instruction, fellowship, edification, evangelism and the observance of the ordinances. We believe it is an autonomous, independent body under the Lordship of Christ, the Great Head of the Church. Its pastors and officers are elected by the membership.

**Ordinances**: We believe there are only two ordinances for the church regularly observed in the New Testament and commanded by Christ:

Baptism which is the immersion in water, whereby a person publicly identifies with Christ in His death, burial and resurrection.

The Lord's Supper which is the memorial wherein the believer partakes of the two elements, the bread and the cup, which symbolize the Lord's body and shed blood proclaiming His death until He comes.

The Church and State: We believe in the entire separation of church and state.

**Religious Liberty**: We believe in religious liberty; that every man has the right to practice and propagate his beliefs.

**The Lord's Day**: We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day and that, in a special sense, it is the divinely appointed day for worship and spiritual exercise.

**Civil Government**: We believe that civil government is of divine appointment for the interest and good order of society; that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honoured and obeyed, except only in the things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience and Prince of the kings of the earth.

# MISSION AND VISION STATEMENT



What love the Father has lavished upon us once again this year. We truly continue to experience His blessing and favour as a local assembly of believers. The Elders and Advisory Boards consistently meet together for periods of discussion and prayer during our monthly meetings. We, as your church leadership, entreat God to be the focal point of our ministry here at Forward. We seek His direction as we lead the church. We also use our time together to appeal to our Heavenly Father on behalf of the sick and the lost.

The Elders also meet regularly as an independent group. We have used our time to encourage and develop each other as we share what God is doing in each of our lives. We pray through the prayer requests submitted to the church. Additionally, we pray for the needs of the church body known to us and update each other on the visitation we have undertaken.

We continue to discuss the vision and direction of our church as we try to understand how best to glorify God, grow in Christ and go with the gospel to a broken and hurting world. As Elders, we discuss church matters that have arisen throughout this year to decide how best to address or resolve them.

We had the pleasure this year of formally recognizing Pastor Aaron Woodhouse as an Elder. He has graciously served alongside us for many years, but it was good for the congregation to endorse his Eldership officially.

In addition to our elected Elders, we have also enjoyed the counsel of Advisory Board Chair John Deinum and our Youth Intern Pastor Mark Memije, who have both served alongside us as we seek to serve you.

I've been working my way slowly through it and am about halfway through chapter 2 at the moment. One of the things I like about memorizing Scripture is that it forces me to stop and mull over all the details of a passage. When I read the Bible, it's easy to skip some of the little details and move on to the things that seem more weighty, but when I'm trying to memorize a big passage I have to spend time going over each and every word and phrase. One of the little details that I have zoomed over in the past is right at the start of the letter. After Paul addresses the letter, he says, "I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now" (Phil. 1:3-5 NIV). Have you ever spent much time thinking about those verses? I hadn't, but I'm glad I have now. Because of these verses, I have been thinking a lot about how thankful I am for all of you in our Forward family. It is really encouraging to see how God is working in your lives and how you are partnering in the gospel. In the past year, I have heard so many of you talk about sharing the gospel with the people around you in your life. I have seen you love each other and grow together in Christ. I have seen you take your calling as a servant of Christ seriously. And I'm thankful for all of you. It is a joy to be one of your pastors.

None of us are perfect and we don't walk with Christ perfectly. We are sinners who have been forgiven and made new by Christ, who are trying to serve Him out of gratitude for His grace and mercy. # **Preaching Ministry**



In 2017, we explored some less well known parts of the Bible by diving into the minor prophets together. In 19 weeks, we covered 8 of the 12 minor prophets and learned about God's passion for justice and His mercy to sinners. In the New Testament we went through 1 Thessalonians together and learned about

the hope we have in Christ and how it motivates us towards holiness.

We also spent several weeks together in a topical series we called "One Body" in which we explored some of the key things we do when we gather as a church (membership, communion, baptism, church discipline, etc.) and why we do them.



We enjoyed having Pastor David Bell preach on our 98th Anniversary Sunday in May. Pastor Bell was the Senior Pastor at Forward from 1982-1993, so it was a really special treat to have him in our pulpit again. I'm also really thankful that he was able to fill in for Aaron and me during the summer and preach at Forward twice more.

In the summer, we also had the exciting privilege of having one of our young men, Liam Freer, preach for us. Liam grew up at Forward and served as a summer intern with us this year. It was so encouraging to be able to work with him as he developed his sermon and then to hear him preach it. I'm also grateful for all the other men who stepped into our pulpit and preached God's Word to us this year - Pastor Ron Farr, Pastor Aaron Woodhouse, Mark Memije, and Shawn Freer, as well as our two missionary guest speakers, Valera Strugoff (who serves with MoveIn) and Dan Shurr (the director of Fellowship Aid & International Relief for FEB International).

#### **Discipleship & Small Groups**

This year, we re-launched our men's discipleship ministry. John Deinum took charge of this important ministry and got it going in the fall. I'm really thankful for his efforts and passion to see men grow in Christ and develop as leaders in the church. I'm also thankful to Pastor Aaron, Mark Memije, and Don Webster who are leading Bible study and discipleship groups for men.

Our women's Bible studies and discipleship groups continue to flourish and be effective. I'm very thankful for all the hard work Carol Bain, Deborah Michaud, Eunice Chaffey, and Patricia Overholt put into leading these groups.

These discipleship groups have taken the place of some of our small groups this year. Some of the small groups have disbanded and the members have become involved in the men's and women's Bible studies that already existed or have newly started. I continue to lead one small group at my home on Tuesdays as well as the Wednesday night prayer meeting at the church. Both these groups are "co-ed." Whether they are called Bible studies, discipleship groups, small groups, or prayer meeting, I am so pleased to see the way our people are gathering together to study God's Word, pray, and fellowship.

#### Salvation, Baptism, and Membership

We began 2017 by praying again that God would use us to see 10 people turn their lives over to Christ and be saved. As far as we know, God did not give us the ten we asked for, but I do know of at least four people who made professions of faith this year after hearing the gospel either through church ministries or as attendees of the church. I praise God that He used our church to bring these four - and perhaps more - into His family!

None of these new Christians have been baptized yet but I know they are keen to do so! However, this year we did baptize four others who had been Christians for some time. See the church clerk's report for full details on baptisms this year.

We were very glad to welcome two new members into our church this year. We were also very happy to welcome Pastor John McNeill back as a member of Forward this year. Pastor John served as the senior pastor of Forward from 1994-2014.

#### Seminary

Thank you once again for allowing me to develop myself as a pastor as I continue my education this year. In May 2012, I began taking courses part time at Heritage Seminary in Cambridge and working towards my MDiv. I am currently taking my last two classes and, Lord willing, I will graduate this April. #### Outreach, Family, and Children's Ministry

We have seen many exciting things happening in the Outreach, Family, and Children's Ministries at Forward Baptist Church this past year. Some of the initiatives included:

**Oasis Family Camp at Beacon Bible Camp:** For the fourth summer, John and Mary Deinum and Aaron and Christine Woodhouse directed this camp with the help of 15+ amazing volunteers - many from Forward Baptist Church. We had some families from Forward attend and it was a huge success. As we look forward to Oasis Family Camp 2018, please pray for it this summer. Pray that as we spend a week in the beauty of God's creation and in authentic community with others, families and individuals will be changed, come to know Jesus as Saviour and King, and grow in grace and love.

**PA Day Camps:** This ministry was started during the 2014/15 school year and has grown to almost 60 kids at each camp. This past year we had over 30 different people volunteer for anywhere from four hours to 50 hours. At each camp, we have the opportunity to share the gospel, serve families by caring for their kids, and represent Christ to the kids that attend the camp. We have had a great time building connection points with kids and families in our community. The hope is that we will make connections with families around the church and have the opportunity to model Christ and share the gospel. Each camp day requires 20+ volunteers. To all those who have volunteered: thanks for serving so faithfully and well; it has been a really fun year at PA Day Camps.

**Nursery and KidZone:** This year we started using new curriculum called "The Gospel Project." It is a three year chronological Christ-centered Bible study for kids, that examines how all Scripture gives testimony to Jesus Christ. Our Nursery program is offered from 10:30 am-12 pm each Sunday morning and our KidZone takes place approximately half way through the service from 11 am - 11:45 am. We had about 3-6 kids attend each week in the Nursery and 8-14 kids in Kidzone. Forward Children's Ministry requires a lot of volunteers to serve and love all our kids. We have 18-22 volunteers on a rotating schedule that have served faithfully this past year. You all are amazing!

**Above the Beach Drop In:** We continue to see 50-75 kids/parents/caregivers each Tuesday morning between 9:30 and 11:30 am at this outreach ministry. Thanks to our wonderful, friendly greeter, Bertha Sharpe, as she welcomes everyone with a smiling face and help getting in. Also a big thanks to Mary Deinum, Becky Lambert, Janet Theunissen, Christine Woodhouse, and Terry Donaldson for serving in this ministry. We are meeting a need in the neighbourhood. Pray that we would be able to meet the spiritual needs of those who come and connect with us.

**Community Food Bank:** On the second Tuesday of each month, around 30 people gather together in our fellowship hall to participate in the food bank. Our time starts at 9:30 am with some tea, coffee, and light food. Around 9:45 am someone shares a gospel message or testimony, calling others to know God personally, see God at work in their lives and life situations and follow Him in repentance and faith. We close with prayer and give an invitation to join the Forward Baptist Church Community on Sundays and at our various events. We also offer a free Bible to those interested - most months we will give away 2-5 Bibles. Pray that we will continue to love, serve and share of ourselves with people that live in the Beach Hill Community.

**Summer Interns:** This past summer we had 4 interns working at Forward for 6-16 weeks. A big thank you to our amazing summer intern team this year. We had Claire Zacharias, James Power, Justine Cudao, and Liam Freer as our summer interns. Our summer interns worked hard from May-August serving in a variety of different ways and in different ministries. They were involved in many weekly ministries like A/V, Children's Ministry, Above the Beach and had many weekly responsibilities. They were also responsible for planning, implementing and running many events and projects during the summer. Some quick highlights: Community Street Sale and connection event (May), Volunteer Gala (June), Bowmore School Fundraiser (June), four Summer Camps, two Backyard Bible Camps, Food Bank, and a variety of other awesome things. I want to thank Claire Zacharias, James Power, Justine Cudao, and Liam Freer. Without their dedicated and talented work we would not have been able to do all that we accomplished in the summer of 2017. They were outstanding!

**Forward Summer Camps:** Our camps continue to grow year after year for a number of reasons. We consistently offer a great, gospel focused, and fun camps, with fantastic leaders. Our summer camps are just one part of our larger outreach into the neighbourhood. Many of our programs feed into each other and help to build momentum. Above the Beach, Jr. Youth, and PA Day Camps have been instrumental in building the summer camps and other programs. I believe that we need many connection points over many years to gain opportunity, respect and a platform to share the gospel with neighbours who will listen. Pray for those connection points.

This summer, our half-day kids camp for kids in JK to grade 6 had 58 kids attend, which is up from 45 kids in 2016. We also had over 30 different volunteers help. We welcomed approximately 18 people from the Chapel Street Church Youth Group from Chicago. They served alongside us at our half-day camp. Our Cooking Camp had about 8 kids attend, Youth Camp had about 7 kids attend, and our two Backyard Bible Camps had 15 - 20 kids attend in total.

Please remember to pray for our Summer Camps in 2018. Pray for the volunteers, summer interns, kids, and families. Please ask God to help us clearly share the gospel and see kids come to understand that Jesus loves them and that we would effectively disciple Christian kids to grow in their faith.

**Christ Centered Twelve Step Program:** In January of 2017, Forward had the privilege of inviting an existing Twelve Step Bible Study group to move from the home where they had been meeting for several years, into the church. This would allow the group to grow & also be less of a burden on the home that had been hosting them for all that time.

A Twelve Step group is based on the set of guiding principles originally developed by Alcoholics Anonymous for recovery from addictive, compulsive, or other behavioural problems. These principles have been used for over eighty years to help people recover from addictions and brokenness.

The Twelve Step Bible Study uses the Life Recovery Bible to study the twelve steps in relation to how our amazing God has set out to recover a broken people and redeem them for Himself.

When hearing of addiction, many people think of alcoholics, drug addicts, perhaps gambling or even food addicts, but working the twelve steps can also lead to recovery from any and all of the brokenness of life because the steps get to the root problems of that hurt.

Our Twelve Step Bible Study meets here at the church every Sunday at 6 pm for a meal and then holds a Bible study from 7-8:30 pm. It doesn't close down for the summer or for holidays, because addiction doesn't take holidays.

Please pray for those coming into the church who are seeking help and recovery. Also consider whether you have anything that you need healing from and might benefit from a loving support group.

**Community Engagement:** As a church we are engaged in loving, serving and sharing the love of Christ with the people that live in the Beach Hill and East York neighbourhoods. We have done this by making connection points with various people and groups. We have also called our church to engage in participating in these various connection points. This past year our church was involved in a number of opportunities to connect, which were used as opportunities for us to be engaged with what the community is doing and also to invite those who live in the Beach Hill area to be involved with what we are doing. Some quick highlights:

- Beach Hill Community Cleanup Day, April 2017 Forward co-hosted this event and approximately 40+ people helped clean up the neighbourhood on a Saturday morning.

- Bowmore School Fundraiser, June 2017
- Halloween Outreach Event, October 2017
- Community Christmas Carol Sing, December 2017
- Toronto City Mission Christmas Meal, December 2017
- Monthly fellowship meals following our Sunday services
- Beach Hill Choir a community choir
- Multiple Summer Camps
- Twelve Step Bible Study, Sunday evenings @ 6:00 pm
- Good Food Box Program, bi-weekly
- Above the Beach, PA Day Camps, Food Bank, and more

The depth with which they are rooted in both our daily lives and our faith gives a special weight to these seasons that helps us to focus intently on what Christ accomplished for us in His coming and in His dying. To each of you who took the time to help prepare music, readings, join the Advent Choir, etc., thank you!

**Summer Interns:** Each summer it is a joy to have the summer interns join us. This gives me the opportunity to assign some of my weekly tasks to them and focus on bigger projects on my list that I don't usually have time to tackle. It also gives me the honour of intentionally mentoring someone. This year it was my cousin Claire. She shared my office and we were able to have many good conversations together about the practical connections between faith and daily life and ministry.

**Beach Hill Choir:** Early in the year we invited choir members to contribute name ideas for the choir. They participated with many great ideas and we chose a name for the choir! We are now Beach Hill Choir. Our spring concert theme was pop music through the decades, and the fall concert theme was musicals. We finished the year with a healthy 70 adults and 12 kids in the choirs. I am continually thankful for the participation of church members in the choir! I encourage you to be praying for the choir members. It is fantastic to see how the community engages with music and we desire to see deep relationships formed that lead people to Christ.

**Worship God Conference: Human & Holy:** In July I had the opportunity to attend a worship conference that explored healthy tensions that should exist in our gathered worship. It was a refreshing and highly encouraging time for me as I attended the sessions, got to know people from our larger church family, and gained new ideas and tools to use in my role here at Forward.

**Singspiration:** Each year a group of the Fellowship Churches in Toronto meet together for 2-3 shared evenings of worship. 2017 was a rewarding year to be part of organizing and leading these evenings because I had the joy of inviting musicians from all the churches to participate in a joint worship band. In cooperation with the host church, this band led the congregational worship. It was a delight to begin getting to know other people involved in leading music in our Toronto Fellowship Churches.

**Congregational Care:** Every season is unique, but here is a taste of some of the ways I participate in congregational care.

- Shut-ins bulletins, congregational letters, etc. are mailed out regularly.
- Coffee/tea with new congregation members or members in need of conversation, prayer, or encouragement.
- Drop-in conversations with community members who need prayer, etc.
- Encouragement cards and phone calls.
- Ongoing phone/email answering and addressing needs as they come up.
- Discipleship with a few young women in the church who are keen to grow.

**Communications/Publications:** Ministry in all forms is full of surprises. Here are some of the ongoing tasks in this category.

- Bulletins: bi-monthly, weekly Sunday, and weekly prayer.
- Graphic design for posters/slides/postcards as needed.
- Mass emails are sent out weekly/as needed to keep you updated and connected.
- Communications with BHNA and other neighbourhood connections to mention our events in their email blasts and help raise awareness of our presence in the community.
- Website ongoing updates and changes.
- Calendar continual updates to make sure it reflects the events at the church correctly.

In Christ,

Sarah Quartel Director of Worship & Communications I sat beside them in a local tea shop by the beaches and noticed the mother could not get her eight-year-old daughter interested in cross-stitching. The mother, noting my philosophy textbook, said, "She's been having those, 'what's the meaning of life questions' again."

"What's the point?" the daughter chimed in, then spun around to let the adults do the talking.

"You just make it up. I've accepted there's no real point in life... I think I'm okay with that."

"And is your daughter okay with that?" I asked.

She hesitated, "No... but she's young, she thinks in binary, she's still immature... she thinks simply."

*I replied, "Perhaps it's because she thinks sincerely... I try not to underestimate the insight of a child."* 

The mother conceded, and the daughter grinned. And as they were walking out, I bowed my head to pray for them.

The daughter paused by the door to thoughtfully say, "It's nice to meet you."

This happened last week, and this isn't an isolated case. A recurring trend I find is that in this post-modern, post-Christian neighbourhood in the Upper Beach area, the sincere inquiry for the meaning of life cannot be so easily snuffed out in the heart of a child because God put it there to begin with. In one instance, when I was door knocking, I met an atheistic couple who, with embarrassed looks on their faces, admitted their two children were fervently Christian and the curious children happily agreed. Some adults admitted entertaining conversations with me only because their children won't stop asking the "questions."

"Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these" (Matthew 19:14 NIV). These are the words of the Good Teacher. There is an essential ministry to share the Good News to young people. Before the world smothers their aspirations to know God, it is crucial we share the Good News to them. North Americans can't pretend we live in the land of Christendom anymore. We must do something. Children are being force-fed a postmodern curriculum, which dictates that there is no actual meaning to life, "just make it up." The Barna website states, "Nearly half of all Americans who accept Jesus Christ as their Saviour do so before reaching the age of 13 (43%)... less than one of every four born again Christians (23%) embraced Christ after their twenty-first birthday." Here at Forward Baptist Church, God has sovereignly placed us in this community to be a strategic outpost of heaven. It is my privilege and joy to share how God has been using Forward Baptist Church. I have been a small cog in the big wheel, along with many other cogs I gladly call co-labourers of Christ, as we minister and are a light, a city built on a hill.

**Jr. Youth**: This is a program that meets once a month for children grades 3-6. It's a free program of games, snacks and a Bible story. This is a crucial age when children are beginning to think for themselves and are asking those big questions. I estimate 30% come from Christian homes and the rest come because parents are just happy to have a peaceful Friday night. The group here has grown considerably. We've doubled since 2016, averaging about twenty plus kids. Here are a few anecdotes I'd like to mention:

- Getting feedback from one of two siblings, I asked if they believed in Jesus. He responded, "Of course." Since when? "Since coming here."
- One boy, when hearing the story of Moses, jumped out of his chair to sit crosslegged on the ground, with animated interest.
- Once when we shared the story of the birth of Jesus, the children irregularly and without prompting applauded afterwards.
- For many, these are new ideas. A concerned girl shared with me that her father told her, "God isn't real."
- Already kids are beginning to form their own opinions. There are twin brothers and one twin constantly interrupted by yelling, 'fake'. The other twin scolded him and was curious to learn about Jesus more. As it is, only one of the twins still consistently attends.

I would like to also use this time to recognize the leaders involved in making this program happen. Without them sacrificing their Friday nights to invest in these children, the program couldn't happen. Leaders who have helped at least once include Aaron Woodhouse, Jamie Cudao, Brittany So, Randi Booker, Danny Cartwright, Rebecca Kabiseba, Zaida Andrea, Nick Freer, Liam Freer, Sarah Hembruff, Micah Akol, David Green, Claire Zacharias, Rachel Deinum, and Anna Deinum.

**Youth Group**: The youth group has had some rough goings. For much of the year, we were wrestling with the vision of the program, whether this was an outreach program or a place of discipleship. If catered to the whims of troubled youth, the more behaved kids would be neglected. But we didn't want this program to be some holy huddle either. We ended up putting our foot down. We wanted to encourage the people who wanted to grow in their faith. Currently, we have a smaller youth group of about 5-6 kids. Those who do come, don't come for a robust program, but for discipleship. I remain optimistic about the future of this group; we're starting to build a solid foundation of young people who are there for Jesus—from there that's where healthy growth will occur. The goal for

us is not to be successful, but to be faithful. We will teach the Word, encourage the disheartened, live by example, and admonish when need be and God in His time will make the group grow.

One youth was telling me how his friends were consistently puzzled he doesn't go to parties with them. "Youth group," was his response—he's sharing his faith through his example. Another youth was in tears the first time we prayed. Nowadays he consistently raises objections, but for some reason comes back week after week. In our newly implemented Bible reading, he's several weeks ahead. "Is it hard?" was the question asked by one youth during our one-on-one discipleship. (He hails from a non-Christian home.) He was asking if it was hard to transform his school by sharing the Gospel. We told him, "Yes, it is hard, but nothing is impossible with God."

As for our curriculum, we started the book of James in the beginning of the year, then stopped in the spring to speak on various key subjects like prayer, reading the Bible, and the Great Commission. We resumed the book of James again in the fall. One of the blessings we've had is strong leadership with a passion to go above and beyond to minister to this group of kids. The leaders who helped throughout the year were: Sam Deinum, David Nunn, Becky Lambert, Jamie Cudao, Kathryn House, Liam Freer, and Claire Zacharias. We had about 3-4 leaders on any given night.

Act II: College and Career: Young adults, like any demographic, need spiritual camaraderie to spur them on in their faith, yet this is a neglected age group in many churches. Many Christians in this age group can fall by the wayside, often because entering a secular school or work environment can easily dishearten a believer. Through our ministry, we've been able to reach out to people who would otherwise slip through the cracks. It's been a joy watching this group flourish. There's really been a culture of friendship and like-mindedness. Our program has four parts: we begin with announcements & an icebreaker, transition to songs, have a Bible study, and finally break out into small groups for prayer.

In our this program, we've had young adults coming and going. This is indeed the nature of young adults, who live in a period of transition. At our highest, we were averaging in the mid-20s. But near the end of the year we dropped to around low-10s. I want to thank the leaders for their dedication and support of this ministry. These leaders include Brittany So, Sam Deinum, and Nick Freer.

**Other Involvements**: I attended the Twelve Step Bible study group and connected with a few people from there. I met up bi-weekly with some young men from Act II for discipleship. I led the Bible Station for most P.A Camps. I occasionally did beach

evangelism along with a couple of young adults and I led an evangelism excursion with missionaries from Chicago. I also did some door-to-door evangelism.

Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up (Galatians 6:9 NIV).

# FINANCE COMMITTEE

God continued to bless Forward in 2017 through the answering of our prayers, providing a committed and God fearing pastoral staff team and by providing amazing members who give graciously. This once again ensured that the church had sufficient financial means to support our mission to continue to Glorify God, Grow in Christ and Go with the Gospel.

We are grateful and praise God that the 2017 givings are the highest since 2014, and 4% higher when compared to 2016. The 2017 expenditure was 7% higher than 2016, resulting in a deficit of \$15,465 for 2017, compared to the budgeted deficit of \$96,580. Available funds at the end of 2017 were \$181,904 compared to \$198,889 at the end of 2016 and the church finances continue to be healthy.

The 2017 expenditure mainly supported the following activities:

- Staff and Pastoral costs;
- Maintain the church activities;
- Maintain the building;
- · Maintain the current support of Missionaries; and
- Improvements to the church facilities.

As a church family, we believe that God has provided the staff members who serve at Forward. We believe that God wants us to reach out to the neighbourhood. We believe that God wants us to be united, a church that takes care of its members, young and old, near and far, and to support our missionaries. These are not all of our activities or goals, but summarize what we as the Advisory Board, and hopefully the whole congregation, believe God wants to do through us. We ask the church to include this in your prayer and consideration when giving to our church, and thank everyone who is already giving in abundance. With this in mind, please continue to pray that as a congregation, together we would discern how God would direct us to use the resources He has given.

Staffing and expenditures to maintain the building continue to represent a significant proportion of our annual expenditures and will continue to be for 2018 as it makes up the core of our church.

I would like to thank the members of the finance committee: Carol Bain, Charles Chaffey, and Allister Walsh for their assistance and prayer. I also want to thank our regular tellers: Charles Chaffey, Allister Walsh, Marianne Potter and Richard Rawlins, our head teller, who faithfully count the money and prepare the deposits each week. We are once again thankful for the way God's people have supported the work at Forward. May God bless you as you give cheerfully to the work of our Lord.
