# **Background and Content**

#### Introduction:

- 1. The international word of the year according to Oxford Dictionaries is "post-truth."
  - a. The definition: "relating to or denoting circumstances in which objective facts are less influential in shaping public opinion than appeals to emotion and personal belief."
  - b. The editors found that circulation of the term had increased by 2,000 per cent in 2016, compared to the previous year.
  - c. One of the late-breaking stories of 2016 was a Buzzfeed News Analysis that found that during the final three months of the U.S. presidential election campaign, fake election news on Facebook outperformed real news. In other words, false stories got more engagement clicks, likes, shares, comments than real stories from such major news outlets as the New York Times, Washington Post, Huffington Post and NBC News
- 2. In his 1991 book The Malaise of Modernity based on his talks for the CBC Massey Lectures, philosopher Charles Taylor writes about "features of our contemporary culture and society that people experience as a loss or decline, even as our civilization 'develops.' " He argues that technology has, in some ways, "flattened and narrowed" our lives: "People have spoken of a loss of resonance, depth, or richness of our human surroundings."

Statistics about the Growth of the Church around the World Average Rating: Not rated [see ratings/reviews]

In his book Witness Essentials, Dan Meyer lists some encouraging statistics about the growth of the church around the world:

- In 1900 Korea had no Protestant church. Today, there are over 7,000 churches in just the city of Seoul, South Korea.
- At the end of the 19th century, the southern portion of Africa was only 3 percent Christian. Today, 63 percent of the population is Christian, while membership in the churches in Africa is increasing by 34,000 people per day.
- In India, 14 million of the 140 million members of the "untouchable" caste have become Christians.
- More people in the Islamic world have come to Christ in the last 25 years than in the entire history of Christian missions.
- In Islamic Indonesia, the percentage of Christians is now so high (around 15 percent) that the Muslim government will no longer print statistics.
- In China, it is estimated that there are now more self-avowed disciples of Jesus than members of the Communist party. Even the most conservative estimates suggest that China will soon have more Christians than any country.
- Across the planet, followers of Jesus are increasing by more than eighty thousand per day.
- 510 new churches form every day.

Meyer concludes: "The irony is that, except for the Middle East (where Christianity was born) and Europe and America (to whose civilization it gave birth), Christianity is expanding everywhere today."
